MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS Wednesday, March 29, 2017

I. CALL TO ORDER

There being a quorum, the regular meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order at 2:35 p.m., Wednesday, March 29, 2017. Present at the meeting were:

II. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Director Mendiola made motion to nominate Mr. Francisco G. Santos as Chairman of the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors, seconded by Director Taitano. Motion was unanimously approved.

Director Taitano made motion to retain Mr. Oscar A. Calvo as Vice Chairman of the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors, seconded by Director Mendiola. Motion was unanimously approved.

The Vice Chairman made motion to retain Ms. Melanie R. Mendiola as the Board Secretary of the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors, seconded by Director Taitano. Motion was unanimously approved.

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. **February 13, 2017 – Regular Board Meeting:** The Vice Chairman made motion to approve the minutes of February 13, 2017 subject to correction. The motion was seconded by Director Mendiola and was unanimously passed.

IV. PUBLIC COMMENTS

- b. **Employee Comments:** None.
- c. **PAGGMA Association:** PAGGMA Vice President Raymond Santos extended an invite to the Board to the Port's *Silebrasion Mes Chamorro 2017* event on March 30, 2017 at 11:00 a.m.

V. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The General Manager's report was provided for Board's information. The following key item(s) are noted as follows:

- 1. Oversight Hearing: Committee on Guam U.S. Military Buildup, Infrastructure and Transportation: A Port Oversight hearing was held on March 3, 2017 regarding Guam YTK Corporation vs Port Authority of Guam. A presentation was provided to the Committee which include: the history of Hotel Wharf, 21 GCA Section 60112, Public Law 26-28, Guam YTK Development Agreement & Lease, history and current status of YTK matters related to Arbitration and Litigation as well as a comparison of the approval process for the Cementon Micronesia lease that went through the procedures required by law and was approved by the Guam Legislature.
- 2. Court Filings with Regards to YTK: On February 22, 2017, the Attorney's for Guam YTK Corporation, Kathleen Fisher and Genevieve Rapadas from Calvo Fisher & Jacob LLP, filed a Writ of Execution in the Superior Court of Guam that, if signed by Judge Sukola, would authorize the Marshall of the Court to do the following:

Make and satisfy the said Judgment with interest and costs as provided by law, and your costs and disbursements out of the personal property of the Port, including without limitation, all deposit accounts and tangible and intangible personal property of any kind, and if sufficient personal property cannot be found, then out of the real property of the Port;

The instructions to the Court Marshall with regards to the Writ of Execution stated the following:

Make and satisfy the judgment with interest and costs as provided by law, and your costs and disbursements out of the personal property of Defendant Port Authority of Guam, including without limitation, all deposit accounts and tangible and intangible personal property of any kind.

The award amounts requested of \$12,700,000.00 and attorney's fees in the amount of \$1,257,852.00 and its costs in the amount of \$137,788.28.

The Writ would have been required to be returned after ten (10) but not more than sixty (60) days after authorization by the Court.

The YTK attorney's also filed a Notice of Levy on Deposit Accounts and Safe Deposit Boxes of Defendant to be sent to the following banks and credit unions: Allied Bank, Bank of Guam, Bank Pacific, Coast 360 Federal Credit Union, First Commercial Bank, Merrill Lynch, Pentagon Federal Credit Union, ANZ Guam, Inc., Bank of Hawaii, Community First Guam Federal Credit Union, First Hawaiian Bank, Pacific Islands Development Bank, Oceanic Bank and Philippine National Bank.

The Notice of Levy relayed the following:

Please take notice that all monies, letters of credit due or owing, contents of any safe deposit boxes in your possession or under your control belonging to he within named judgment debtor, Port Authority of Guam, is here by levied in accordance with the Writ of Execution attached hereto.

On March 2, 2017, the Port Authority of Guam and YTK appeared before Judge Sukola with regards to the Port's objection to YTK's Writ of Execution and the Port's motion for Stay Pending Appeal.

Port's Attorney Mike Phillips argued that the following points included in Judge Sukola's Order of March 3, 2017 concerning the Port's Motion to Stay:

Defendant notes that the Court, in rendering its decision to stay execution, should Consider various factors, such as the Defendant's likelihood of success on the merits of its Motion for Reconsideration and its forthcoming appeal.

Defendant further notes that the Court should consider the threat of irreparable harm to the Defendant and to the people of Guam in the vent the Judgment is executed.

Lastly, the Defendant briefly argues that, in the event a stay is granted, the Plaintiff will not suffer any potential harm, and that "[a]ny supposed injury to [Plaintiff] is far outweighed when compared against the irreparable harm to the people of Guam if Port operation were disrupted or halted.

Judge Sukola stated in her Order that she would reserve consideration on the Port's assertions related to the merits of its case but did address the greater impact to the community. She relayed:

The Court will, however, consider the Defendant's concerns regarding potential irreparable harm to the Defendant and to the people of Guam in the event the Judgment is executed pursuant to the Plaintiff's request. In light of these concerns, the Court, in its discretion, finds that a stay in the execution of the Judgment is warranted pending the disposition of Defendant's Motion for Reconsideration.

Judge Sukola did note that "the Court will stay execution of its February 3, 2017 Judgment, but only pending disposition of Defendant's Motion for Reconsideration."

- Public Hearing Scheduled for Legislative Resolution No. 62-34: A public hearing was held this morning by the Committee on Guam U.S. Military Buildup, Infrastructure, and Transportation on Resolution No .62-34 relative to authorizing the legislative counsel or other retained counsel, to apply for and file an amicus curiae brief before the Superior and Supreme Courts of Guam affirming the Guam Legislature's position relative to sovereign immunity and the upholding of Guam law. The resolution asserts that the YTK's "Lease Agreement with the Port exceeding the five-year maximum the Legislature set in Public Law 26-28." The resolution also asserts the authority of the Government of Guam with regards to its sovereign immunity and a limited waiver provided through the Government Claims Act. The Resolution also states that "the same waiver of sovereign immunity is not provided in Guam's arbitration laws...". The Resolution also states that "by applying for and filing an amicus curiae brief before the Superior and Supreme Courts of Guam regarding the specific rulings on Public Law 26-28 and the Courts' findings that the Guam Legislature waived sovereign immunity to an extent greater than is contained in the Government Claims Act, it is the intent of the I Mina'Trentai Kuattro Na Liheslaturan Guahan that the Courts of Guam and all applicable government agencies interpret the relevant statutes in line with Liheslaturan Guahan's clear mandates contained therein;..."
- 4. Arrival of Port Fork Lifts: The remaining 10-ton and 20-ton forklifts procured by the Port arrived on February 14, 2017. The official turnover of the forklifts from the vendor Morrico occurred on March 15, 2017. The acquisition of the forklifts represents the final procurement of equipment initiated in 2016 under the \$5.5M funding provided by a combination of the Port's loans with the USDA, Bank of Guam and the Ports operational budget.
- 5. **PUC Hearings on Port 5-Year Tariff Petition PAG Docket 17-01:** On March 27, 2017, the Port issued a notice to all shipping agents and port users of the PUC public hearings concerning the Port's tariff petition. The public hearings were held on April 5-7, 2017. Afterwards, PUC will then hold its regular monthly meeting during the latter part of April 2017. If the PUC grants approval to the Port's 5-year tariff petition request, the implementation date will be set for June 1, 2017.
- 6. Confirmation and Swearing-in of Board Member Francisco Santos: On March 9, 2017, the Guam Legislature voted on the re-nomination by the Governor of former Board member Francisco Santos to serve on the Port Board. He was confirmed by a majority vote. Mr. Santos was sworn in on March 17, 2017.
- 7. **Appointment of Nathan Taimanglo to Serve as Board Member:** The Governor appointed Nathan Taimanglo on March 9, 2017 to serve on the Port Board. A confirmation hearing was then held on March 29, 2017. If favorable, Mr. Taimanglo will address the final vacancy to the Port Board.

VI. OLD BUSINESS

a. Retirement: Defined Benefits Plan: Mr. Alfred F. Duenas, Deputy General Manager of Admin/Finance (DGMA) mentioned that he had confirmed with Retirement Fund that in the event Mr. Pedro Leon Guerrero desires to pursue readmission into the Defined Benefits Plan, his employee share would be \$90K and the Port share at \$61K. He recommended that Mr. Leon Guerrero be allowed the opportunity of one year to remit full payment into his employee share to Retirement Fund and only upon evidence of full remittance, the Port will then remit its share of \$61K. The General Manager mentioned that the figures represent the cumulative interest that would have been earned had it been invested back then at that time. The DGMA reminded the members that at the time of Mr. Leon Guerrero's employment with the Port during the period of March 24, 1993 thru January 3, 1995, he was not given the opportunity to participate into the retirement program as mandated by law. Director Taitano asked how the one year deadline for remittance came about. The DGMA replied that due to the size of the commitment, the deadline of the one year period was mutually acceptable during discussions held with himself, Retirement Fund Director and Mr. Leon Guerrero.

After discussion, the Vice Chairman made motion to allow for a one year period for Mr. Pedro A. Leon Guerrero to remit his employee contribution of \$90,000.00 for purposes of the Define Benefits Plan to the Retirement Fund as mutually agreed upon by relative parties, and only upon evidence of Mr. Leon Guerrero's full remittance, the Port Authority will then remit its employer share of \$61,000.00 to the Retirement Fund. Motion was seconded by Director Mendiola and was unanimously approved.

- b. Center for Homeland Defense and Security's 2017 Pacific Executive Leaders Program, March 13-16, 2017, Honolulu, Hawaii: Mr. Felix R. Pangelinan, Deputy General Manager of Operations (DGMO) mentioned that the Pacific Executive Leaders Program is by exclusive invitation only which the Board had approved at its previous meeting for one port personnel to attend. However, two days after that Board meeting, similar invitation was extended to port personnel, Jose Javellana, to attend. In light of this, and in keeping with Board's approval and support of this program, Board ratification is being requested The Vice Chairman made motion to ratify the travel for port personnel Jose Javellana to attend the Center for Homeland Defense and Security's 2017 Pacific Executive Leaders Program held on March 13-16, 2017 in Hawaii. Motion was seconded by Director Mendiola and was unanimously approved.
- c. Pacific Executive Leader Program / Matson Navigation Meeting: The DGMO mentioned that the Board approved the travel of the Pacific Executive Leader Program scheduled on March 13-16, 2017 at its previous meeting for the DGMO to attend in Hawaii. While in Hawaii, the DGMO arranged a meeting with Matson Navigation headquarters on March 17-20, 2017 to address matters involving the Port's maintenance program. Matson was recently awarded the bid for the Port's technical services of port cranes. As such, Board ratification is being requested for the March 17-20, 2017 travel to include a \$1,500.00 per diem. Director Mendiola made motion to ratify the maintenance program meeting with Matson and port representative Felix Pangelinan on March 17-20, 2017 in Hawaii to include a \$1,500.00 per diem. Motion was seconded by Director Taitano and was unanimously approved.

- d. CONEXPO-CON/AGG Education Professional Development, March 7-11, 2017: The DGMO mentioned that the Board had approved at its previous meeting travel for the education professional development on March 7-11, 2017. Management was later advised that the certification is a two-part program. The first session of the program is scheduled on March 4-6, 2017, followed by the second session on March 7-11, 2017. In light of this, Board ratification is being requested for port participation in the first session of the certification program for an additional travel cost of \$1,434.34. Director Taitano made motion to ratify the travel for the first session of the Education Professional Development on March 4-6, 2017, seconded by the Vice Chairman. Motion was unanimously approved.
- e. AAPA Spring Conference, April 4-6, 2017: At the previous meeting, the Board had approved the travel for the AAPA Spring Conference on April 4-6, 2017. Due to the unavailability of one Board member to attend, management requests for the DGMA Alfred Duenas to attend. The Vice Chairman made motion to authorize travel for DGMA Alfred Duenas to attend the AAPA Spring Conference on April 4-6, 2017 in Washington, DC. Motion was seconded by Director Mendiola and was unanimously approved.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

1. Budget Transfer Request:

- a. **CIP Projects:** The DGMA said management is requesting for a budget transfer for capital improvement project on the renovation of Port divisional offices, particularly the Engineering, Safety and Stevedoring at \$45,500.00, to include the upgrade of Port Admin Building, 1st Floor Men's Restroom to be ADA compliant at \$500.00. The funding needed to complete the project totals \$50,000.00. Source of funding is through the Agat Marina Topographic and Hydrographic Survey account. Moved by Director Mendiola and seconded by Director Taitano. Motion was unanimously approved.
- b. **A&E Design for Golf Pier:** The DGMA mentioned that an A/E design services is needed to conduct engineering related work on the Golf Pier Fuel Facility. The physical condition of the pier is reaching a critical point due to seismic events and normal wear and tear. Board approval is being requested to transfer the amount of \$150,000.00 from Other Small Projects account to support this project. The Vice Chairman made motion to authorize the budget transfer in the amount of \$150,000.00 from the Other Small Projects account for the A/E design services for related work on the Golf Pier Fuel Facility. Motion was seconded by Director Taitano and was unanimously approved.
- 2. **Legal Professional Services:** The DGMA mentioned that the legal billing for the month of February 2017 revealed that such billing has exceeded its budget ceiling as per the professional services agreement for legal representation. With the numerous legal proceedings involving court cases to include other legal services required, management anticipates legal services to exceed its budget ceiling moving forward and therefore request for a budget transfer in the amount of \$60,000.00 from the G4S Maintenance account under general expense to Legal Services account. The Vice Chairman made motion to authorize the budget transfer in the amount of \$60,000.00 from the G4S Maintenance account under general expense to Legal Services account to support port legal representation. Motion was seconded by Director Taitano and was unanimously approved.

- 3. **Micronesian Islands Forum:** The DGMA mentioned that the Port received a letter dated March 24, 2017 from the Governor's office indicating that the Governor of Guam will be hosting the Micronesian Islands Forum first week of May 2017. The Port Authority of Guam and Guam Economic Development Authority have been asked to partner in hosting a dinner reception at the Guam Museum on May 1, 2017. The shared cost of the event is estimated at \$5,000.00. Funding source is through the Contractual Services account. Director Taitano made motion to authorize \$2,500.00 to support the Micronesian Islands Forum dinner reception on May 1, 2017, seconded by Director Mendiola. Motion was unanimously approved.

 - a. FY2017 National Hurricane Conference, New Orleans, Louisiana, April 17-20, 2017
 - b. Incident Response to Terrorist Bombing, New Mexico Tech, Socorro, New Mexico, April 24-28, 2017
 - c. Prevention of and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents, New Mexico Tech, Socorro, New Mexico, April 24-28, 2017 and May 15-19, 2017
 - d. 3rd Regional Meeting for Energy and Maritime Transport Ministers, Tonga, April 24-28, 2017
 - e. FY2017 Annual Hazard Mitigation Workshop, Emmitsburg, Maryland, May 31-June 2, 2017

The DGMO mentioned that items (b) and (c) for travel dates of April 24-28, 2017 have been re-scheduled to November 2017. Director Taitano suggested that the approval of those two items be tabled for reasons that it is for next fiscal year. There were no objections. With the exception of items (b) and (c) specific to travel dates of April 24-28, 2017, Director Taitano made motion to approve the travel authorization request as presented or as otherwise designated by the General Manager, seconded by Director Mendiola. The motion was unanimously approved.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to discuss, it was moved by Director Taitano and seconded by the Vice Chairman to adjourn the meeting at 3:30 p.m. The motion was unanimously passed.

PUC Hearing for Port's Tariff Petition

On Monday, April 17, 2017, the Port received notice that the Public Utilities Commission has scheduled a hearing on the Port's Five Year Tariff Petition on Thursday, April 27, 2017. The following matter will be heard:

PAG Docket 15-04, Five Year Tariff Petition, Report by Slater Nakamura Re: Tariff Investigation, ALJ Report, and Proposed Order

Port management and PB consultants will be in attendance. The GM will update the Board on the outcome of the hearing.

PUC Merit Hearing on Cementon Micronesia

As reported to the Board during its August 31, 2016 Board Meeting, Cementon Micronesia, LLC had filed a complaint against the Port Authority of Guam with the Public Utilities Commission on June 10, 2016. Cementon had entered into a lease agreement with the Port back in November 2008 for a cement receiving and operating facility. Cementon receives its cement product through an access pipe installed on Gulf Pier that is transferred from its supply vessel. Cementon has taken a position before the PUC that the company should not be required to pay wharfage charges to the Port and argues that another cement importing company, Hansen Permanente, (preceded by Kaiser Cement Corporation of Guam) is not required to pay wharfage fees in its lease agreement with the Port. This determination was the result of a previous court case against the Port Authority of Guam that prohibited the Port from charging Hansen wharfage fees. Cementon relayed in its complaint to the PUC that it continues to pay wharfage fees in "good faith" including the increase in wharfage fees approved by the PUC in March of 2016. Cementon is also arguing that Golf Pier is not a public facility of the Port of Guam and views the wharfage fee as an imposition on the private use of Golf Pier.

Cementon is requesting the PUC to approve an amendment to Cementon's Lease Agreement to eliminate Section 8 related to wharfage charges and is also requesting that it be credited with all wharfage charges that have been paid to date in addition to a recovery of attorney fees and costs.

The PUC hearing was originally scheduled for Wednesday, January 25, 2017, but was rescheduled to Wednesday, April 19, 2017 at the office of Thompson Thompson & Alcantara. The GM, Deputy GM for Finance and Administration Alfred Duenas, Commercial Manager Glenn Nelson, Acting Financial Affairs Controller and Commercial Specialist Rita Carbullido were subpoenaed as witness for this hearing. Port Counsels Mike Phillips and Darleen Hiton were also in attendance to represent the Port.

The hearing was conducted over a day and a half period with Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) Joephet Alcantara. The GM sat in as the Port's Representative for a full day session on Wednesday, 19, 2017 and Deputy GM Duenas attended the second day hearing that was held for half a day.

The Port is awaiting the decision of the ALJ Alcantara on this matter.

Meeting with Office of Congresswoman Madeleine Bordallo

On Thursday, April 6, 2017, Chairman Francisco Santos, the GM and Deputy GM for Administration and Finance Alfred Duenas met with Congresswoman Madeleine Bordallo's Chief of Staff Matthew Herrmann and Military Legislative Assistant Jason McMahon at the Rayburn House Building in Washington DC.

The GM thanked Chief of Staff Herrmann's assistance in coordinating the meeting as there were Port issues that Chairman Santos and Port management wanted to bring to the Congresswoman's attention. Chief of Staff Herrmann thanked Chairman Santos for meeting with him as the Port has always been an important focus of Congresswoman Bordallo.

The GM relayed that while there has been much discussion concerning the military buildup on Guam, the Port has recorded a continued decrease in the number of containers and an even more significant decrease in breakbulk cargo since the beginning of the fiscal year. She added that in November of 2016, the Port received 51% less breakbulk cargo in comparison to the same time in November of 2015. The GM stated that this was a very good indicator with regards to construction activity on the island that may have been affected by the H2-B Visa issue that has continued to decrease the number of construction workers available on island. She provided the example of a small construction project at the Port's Harbor Master's Office to relocate the emergency access door closest to the emergency exit stairs. The owner of the construction company is now working on the project himself to meet the completion deadline as he has lost some of his workers that were originally assigned to this project.

Chief of Staff Herrmann responded that this is an issue that the Congresswoman's Office is definitely tracking as it is affecting the construction industry and the ability to begin new projects

or complete existing projects. He asked the GM if she could forward him the most recent data as this information will be useful in advocating Guam's case in Washington.

Deputy GM for Finance and Administration Alfred Duenas informed Chief of Staff Herrmann of the Port's plans to pursue a bond to finance infrastructure repairs and the construction of a new Port Administration Building. He discussed the Port's 5-Year Tariff currently before the PUC and the schedule leading up to this summer to address bond acquisition.

The GM went on to discuss the TIGER Grant that was awarded last year to the Port of Guam and was as only one of six Ports in the entire nation to be awarded TIGER for 2016. Chairman Santos relayed his appreciation for the assistance that Congresswoman Bordallo provided in sending a letter of support on behalf of the Port of Guam to the then Secretary of Transportation Anthony Foxx. Chief of Staff Herrmann responded that he was also pleased with the Port's success and stated that the Port of Guam was very fortunate and had good timing as moving forward he stated that TIGER will be eliminated and was not supported by the new Trump Administration. He asked to be kept updated on the progress of H-Wharf.

Chief of Staff Herrmann stated that Congresswoman Bordallo was working with her colleagues to look at alternative funding for medium and small Ports that have not received as much support as larger Ports such as the Port of Los Angeles. The GM concurred that alternate funding to support smaller Port such as Guam would be most helpful as nationally Port infrastructure is a growing issue of concern.

On Monday, April 10, 2017, the GM provided Chief of Staff Herrmann the requested information on the Port's container and breakbulk numbers and the data for the past ten year on cruise arrivals.

Meeting with MARAD Officials

On Friday, April 7, 2017, Chairman Francisco Santos, the GM and Deputy GM for Administration and Finance Alfred Duenas met with the Acting MARAD Administrator Joel Szabat and the U.S. Department of Transportation office in Washington DC. Also attending the meeting were Chief of Staff Brain Varney, and other MARAD representatives Lauran Brand, Jeffrey Balvinsson, David Bohnet, and Robert Bouchard. Administrator Szabat relayed that he is serving as the Acting Administrator until President Donald Trump appoints a new Administrator who will then be confirmed by the U.S. Senate. He will then return to his position as MARAD Executive Director. He thanked Chairman Santos, the GM and Deputy GM for their visit and stated that there were several issues to discuss to include an update on the Guam Port activities since the completion of the Commercial Port Improvement Projects and the implementation status of TIGER.

Chairman Santos extended his appreciation to Administrator Szabat for meeting with the Guam group and also relayed the continuing partnership and support with MARAD for the completion of the upgrades and expansion at the Port of Guam and the implementation of the grant funding for TIGER. GM Brown provided a status update on activities to include the Port's Five Year Tarriff Petition that was currently before the Public Utilities Commission for consideration. She added that the public hearings for the petition occurred over the past several days on Guam from Wednesday, April 5, 2017 to Friday, April 7, 2017 with public meetings being held in Hagatna at the PUC offices, at the Agat Mayors Office and at the Dededo Senior Citizen's Center respectively. The GM stated that she anticipated that the PUC would schedule a hearing towards the end of April to hear the Port's petition. She relayed that if the PUC approves the petition, the Port anticipates going to the bond market by this summer to facilitate financing for a number of projects to include the Port's share of H-Wharf, replacement of the waterline in the Port's old Yard, repairs to Warehouse 1, repairs to Golf Pier and the construction of a new Port Administration Building. She stated that the Port is working with PB to address the updates for the engineering stamps on the design plans.

Deputy GM Duenas further elaborated on the PUC schedule and what steps would be taken to address financing for the Port's projects. He was optimistic that once the PUC hearing was completed, assuming favorable approval is received by the Port, he anticipated going to the bond Market and having funds available towards the end of the summer. Deputy GM Duenas also stated that the Port has also concurrently been working on bond legislation that will be

introduced by Governor Eddie Calvo and forwarded to the Guam Legislature for action. He discussed ongoing dialogue with the Port's new oversight Chairman, Senator Frank Aguon who chairs the Committee on Military Build-up, Infrastructure and Transportation.

The GM went on to discuss some of the corrective issues that were needed for the expanded Yard, LC-5 and the new pump station. She outlined the issues related to the metal tie wires and barbwire that was used on the expanded CMU wall and the chain-link fencing that are rusting quickly and in need of replacement. She added that any type of metal that was installed may not have been properly primed and treated. She added that this situation is also affecting the Three (3) Gate House units. The GM also stated that the base of the railings on LC-5 and the Gatehouse units are cracking and in need of repair. When the railings were originally installed, the rails were not fully secured and required additional concrete pouring to stabilize the railings. The GM relayed that when the Port replaced its older security fencing and did additional repairs to CMU wall, the Port required stainless steel tie wires and barbwire in its specifications that have since held up to the marine environment at the Port.

Chief of Staff Varney responded that EA had reported to MARAD the project had met specifications and that MARAD was in the process of closing out the project. The GM stated that the response to address the needed repairs has been slower than expected and added that issues related to the pavement numbers were raised early last year during the warranty period. However, corrective action has yet to be taken. The GM added that she would forward photos of these locations for MARAD to review.

Chief of Staff Varney stated that MARAD will review the matter and determine what legal mechanism could be pursued to address the corrective actions needed. He inquired if the Port could provide its assessment of the cost for corrective action. The GM responded that she would have the Port's Engineering Division provided an estimated cost for repair and a more detailed listing of the corrective action needed.

Executive Director Varney provided Chairman Santos, the GM and Deputy GM Duenas a copy of the final Dashboard for the Commercial Improvement Projects that has a remaining \$2,659, 421.61. Chairman Santos had asked previous MARAD Administrator Paul Jaenichen for the remaining funds, once the closeout was completed, to be dedicated to the procurement of additional Yard equipment. Administrator Jaenichen had agreed to this request. Chief of Staff Varney inquired if the Port still desired the procurement of additional Top Lifters? The GM responded affirmatively, though she acknowledged that there was additional equipment desired by the Operations Division.

The GM reported that the Port had receive a visit from the Department of Interior's Office of the Inspector General conduct a report on the Port's equipment capacity and repair and maintenance operations. She stated that in December of 2016, the Port had been notified that Interior was suspending its assessment as the Port had already initiated the process of procuring additional Yard equipment and implementing its standard operating procedures for maintenance and repairs.

The GM also reported that as a result of issues concerning foreign labor workers and disapproval of the H-2 B visa applications, a number of construction companies have been losing workers that were not renewed to continue to work on Guam. She stated that this has had significant impact on the island's construction industry and has also affected the Port's Breakbulk cargo which has fallen down as low as 40% on certain months since the beginning of the new fiscal year. The GM relayed that she would provide those numbers to MARAD for their information and reference.

Guam Commercial Port Improvement Project-Deficiency Assessment Log and Cost Estimates

On Friday, April 21, 2017, the GM forwarded the Guam Commercial Port Improvement Project-Deficiency Assessment Log and Cost Estimates to MARAD Chief of Staff Varney. The facilities identified included the following: Pump House Building, Guard Buildings, LC-5 Building, Terminal Gate Booths 1, 2 and 3, Perimeter Fencing to include the CMU Wall and the new Container Yard Striping. The estimated cost provided by Engineer Manager Simeon Delos Santos in coordination with Manager for Equipment Support Services Joaquin Pangelinan was \$483,415.00.

The GM is awaiting a response from MARAD with regards to the desired mechanism to facilitate the repairs needed. Once a determination has been made, the GM will notify the Board.

Decrease in Container Cargo and Decrease on Breakbulk Cargo for the Month of February 2017

According to Acting Financial Affairs Controller Joanne Conway, the Port Authority of Guam as of October 31, 2016 for the new Fiscal Year has handled 39,478 containers. This represents a decrease of 5,063 or an 11% decrease compared to February of 2016 when the Port handled 44,541 containers.

Containers for February of 2017 were divided into the following categories:

Import/Export	26%
Stuffed Transshipment Empty Transshipment	21% 53%

As for the February of 2017, Breakbulk numbers, the Port handled 62,560 revenue tons which represented a decrease of 39,838 revenue tons or a 39% decrease from February of 2016 when the Port handled 102,398 revenue tons.

Restriping of Port Yard

The Port issued its Notice To Proceed with the Yard Restriping Project on Monday, January 30, 2017 to Canton Construction Corp. The completion date for the project is Sunday, July 30, 2017. The cost of the project is \$997,557.51.

The Port's Operations Division is coordinating with the Engineering Division and Contractor Canton to schedule sections of the Yard to be blocked off for repainting to include container parking stalls and crane rail areas.

PUGG Meeting for April 2017

The monthly meeting for the PUGG was held on Thursday, April 20, 2017. Present on behalf of the Port were the GM, Operations Manager John Santos, Chief Planner Dot Harris, Terminal Superintendent Joe Ulloa, Manager for Equipment Support Services Joaquin Pangelinan and Safety Inspector II John Troy Santos.

Attending on behalf of the PUGG were Ambyth Representative Greg David, Matson Representatives Alex Peterson and Tom Dillon, APL Representative John Selleck and MSA Representative Byron Valera.

Attending on behalf of Guam Customs and Quarantine was Lt. David Taitano and Customs Officer III John Aguon.

Attending on behalf of the U.S. coast Guard was LCDR Christy Casey.

Operations Manager John Santos facilitated the meeting and provided a status update on the restriping and renumbering of the Yard. He relayed that there would be locations in the Yard where there will be a replacement of concrete bumpers. He went on to discuss the interim process for Customs and Quarantine conducing its X-Ray inspections due to an adjustment in location as a result of ongoing projects in the Yard. He discussed the procedures related to the broken seal process and stated that there will be a meeting scheduled with the carriers in relation to this issue.

Operations Manager Santos went on to discuss the upcoming ATOSSCOM Conference that will be held in Majuro, Marshall Islands in July of this year. He stated that the organization had a new website and encouraged everyone to go online and review it. He also talked about the current status of the Terminal Operating System (TOS) and the steps being taken to work with NAVIS to address some of the issues with the implementation of the TOS. He also brought up the ongoing issue with regards to challenges G4-S has encountered to provide consistent Wifi service in the Yard.

Operations Manager Santos highlighted his concerns with recent incidences involving damage to the crane spreaders as a result of damaged cell guides on a vessel or the listing of a vessel while it is being serviced by a crane(s). As a result, he stated that if the vessel cannot be properly ballasted, crane operations for the vessel will be suspended. He added that at the rate the spreaders are being damaged, the cranes will end up out of commission as there are only so many spreader parts available to do repairs. He stated that the Port cannot continue to risk damaging the crane spreaders and will take needed precautions, including suspending operations on a vessel if needed.

The GM discussed the noticeable decrease of cargo movement at the Port since the beginning of the new fiscal year in October of 2016. The decrease in the number of containers has ranged between 12% and 19% on a monthly basis and in the case of breakbulk cargo the numbers have

ranged between 13% and 51%. The most recent numbers that were available were up to January of 2017.

The GM also inquired of Lt. David Taitano as to the ongoing rotation of Customs Officers that has resulted in consistent leadership being provided. She noted that this continues to create issues related to different policies and procedures being implemented and complaints related to these issues. Lt. Taitano responded that he has been recently assigned to head the Customs office at the Port and that he is enforcing required policies that have been documented and authorized. The GM stated that the Port does not have an issue with Customs addressing their respective mandates and policies, but did have an issue with the consistency of Custom's implementing these policies that change as leadership changes occur. She asked that if a new policy is to be implemented or an old policy was to be dusted off, a reasonable period of time and notice be provided to the carriers and to the Port to make necessary notices and adjustments needed to address compliance. The GM also stated that she will request a meeting with Customs' management as this has been an issue of concern for some time

Operations Manager Santos inquired if there were any issues or concerns the members desired to have discussed. As there were no further matters raised, the meeting was concluded.

Legislative Confirmation Hearing for Board Nominee Nathan Taimanglo

A public hearing was held on Wednesday, March 29, 2017 by the Committee on Guam U.S. Military Buildup, Infrastructure, and Transportation, chaired by Senator Frank Aguon on Governor Eddie Calvo's nomination of Nathan Taimanglo to serve as a member of the Port's Board of Directors. Mr. Taimanglo's nomination and anticipated confirmation will fill the Board's last position vacancy. Acting Board Chairman Oscar Calvo, Board Member Maria Taitano, Board Member Melanie Mendiola and former Board Chairman and reconfirmed Board Member Francisco Santos provided testimony supporting Mr. Taimanglo's appointment. Port management to include the GM and Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan also testified in favor of Mr. Taimanglo's appointment to the Board.

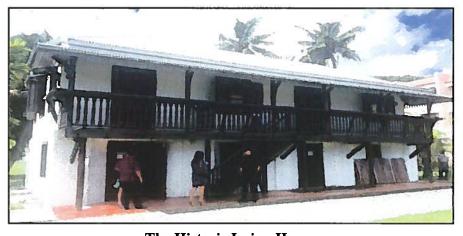

In addition, on Monday, March 27, 2017, the GM held the Division Manager's Meeting at the historical Lujan House in Hagatna at the invitation of Chief Program Officer for the Guam Preservation Trust Joseph Quanata. According to Chief Program Officer Quanata, Jose P. Lujan had entered a Carpentry and Apprentice Program at the Navy Yard in 1907 and had constructed the Lujan House in four years at the age of 20 years old. The house has had a number of uses over the years from a family residence, to a store, to the old Guam Institute and was restored by the Guam Preservation Trust in 2010. The Lujan House was originally constructed in 1911 and celebrated its 100th Anniversary in 2011.

Port Safety Issues

Hydraulic Oil Spill – Top Lifter No. 16-17 Case No. 021-17

On Thursday, March 16, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector III Paul Salas concerning a hydraulic oil spill from Top Lifter No.16-07 that had occurred on Wednesday, March 1, 2017. According to Inspector III Salas, Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion had informed the Safety Office of a hydraulic oil spill at the Matson Staging Area. Inspector III Salas reported that Equipment Operator III Allan Callip had been assigned to operate Top Loader 16-07 to support the daily issuing and receiving of containers. He was loading a 40-foot container onto a 40-foot chassis at the Matson Staging Area when he noticed oil leaking from one of the hydraulic hose lines of the Top Lifter he was operating. The oil was leaking from a busted hydraulic hose line on the mast of the Top Lifter which was cracked due to wear and tear.

Transportation Leader Concepcion reported that the Top Lifter was still under warranty and that Morrico mechanics address the repair of the defective hose.

Inspector III Salas estimated that 2-quarts of hydraulic oil had spilled onto the pavement and was cleaned up by Transportation personnel with the use of absorbent sand and pads. He also reported that the National Response was notified and that Report No. 1172152 was issued.

Inspector III Salas determined that the primary cause of this incident was due to defective hydraulic hose. He recommended that Morrico Mechanics perform preventive maintenance inspections on all equipment to identify potential mechanical problems before they occur. He also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage – Gantry No. 6 Spreader Case No. 22-17

On Tuesday, March 7, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector II, John Troy Santos concerning damage to the Spreader on Gantry No. 6 that had occurred on Monday, March 6, 2017. According to Safety Inspector II Santos, he had received a call from Transpiration Leader Anthony Concepcion informing him that Crane Operator Peter Quichocho had been assigned to discharge containers from the Vessel Mana. While he was in the process of retrieving an Isotainer from Bay No. 5 of the Vessel, the left front flapper on the spreader hit another Isotainer, thus causing damage to the flapper. Crane Operator Quichocho immediately stopped operating the crane and informed Transportation Leader Concepcion of the incident. Police Officer II Jerry Sanchez was present at the incident on behalf of Port Police.

Safety Inspector II Santos determined in his findings that Crane Operator Quichocho had failed to raise the spreader's flapper prior to retrieving the Isotainer. This resulted in damage to the flapper but not to the Isotainer. He concluded that the damage to the Gantry No. 6 flapper was due to inattention on the part of Crane Operator Quichocho. Safety Inspector II Santos also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Coolant Leak on Matson Tractor No. 892 Case No. 23-17

On Wednesday, March 8, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector II Kenneth Santos concerning a coolant leak found on Matson Tractor No. 892 that had occurred on that day. According to Safety Inspector II Santos, he had received a call from Armed Security Guard Ronald Laitan reporting a fluid leak on Matson Tractor No. 892 that was parked at the CFS Warehouse. Matson Operator Mike Cepeda stated that he operated the tractor that same afternoon to move two containers to Area A for staging. Upon completion, he parked the tractor back at the warehouse where it later leaked radiator fluid onto the ground. Port Police II Mike Franquez was present at the incident on behalf of Port Police along.

Safety Inspector II Santos reported that Matson Operator Cepeda had indicated that the radiator core has a pin hole due to the radiator overheating. He also reported that there was approximately 2-quarts of coolant had leaked from the radiator and that Matson personnel used absorbent pads to clean up the coolant. The National Response Center was notified and Report No. 1172636 was issued.

Safety Inspector II Santos concluded that the cause of the incident was due to wear and tear on the tractor radiator. He recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Hydraulic Oil Spill - Tractor No. T-79 Case No. 24-17

On Friday, March 17, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector II John Troy Santos concerning a hydraulic oil spill from Tractor No.T-79 that had occurred on Thursday, March 16, 2017. According to Inspector II Santos, Crane Operator Peter Quichocho had been operating Tractor No. T-79 and was assigned to the Vessel APL. While Operator Quichocho was waiting in line to receive a discharged container from the Vessel APL he was informed by Stevedore Arthur Naputi that hydraulic oil had been leaking from the bottom of Tractor No. T-79. Operator Quichocho then drove the tractor to the dispatch Office and reported the incident to Transportation Leader Concepcion who in turn contacted the Safety and Port Police offices.

Inspector II Santos determined in his findings that Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion had checked the locations traveled by Operator Quichocho and found oil leaks at the following locations: dockside at Cleat 1950 and the Matson's Staging Area by CFS building.

Inspector II Santos reported that Fleet Mechanic II Ionatana Faasuamalie determined that the oil leak was due to a cross-threaded bolt that secures the oil pan to the transmission. He also reported that approximately half a quart of oil leaked on each spill location and that the leaks were cleaned by Transportation Division personnel with the use of absorbent sands and pads. The National Response Center was notified and Report No. 1173329 was issued.

Inspector II Santos concluded that the bolt that was used on Tractor No. T-79 may have already been cross-threaded or as the bolt was being screwed in, it may have not been properly threaded and was forced in causing an improper seating of the bolt creating a space between the oil pan and the transmission allowing oil to escape.

Inspector II Santos recommended that this incident be discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage to Mule Case No. 25-17

On Tuesday, March 21, 2017, the GM received a report dated Monday, March 20, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning an incident that occurred on Thursday, March 16, 2017. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Electrician I Felipe Gico was operating the Electrician's Mule and was assigned to reefer duties. During his operation, Electrician Gico reported that he had placed a roll of reefer power cords on the passenger side deck of the Mule as he claims the cargo bed was already filled with material. While he was driving, he noticed the power cord started to fall off the Mule's deck. Electrician Gico then further stated that as he reached over to gather the cords back in the Mule with his right hand, he inadvertently pulled the steering wheel to the right with his left hand causing the Mule to veer right hitting the front left corner of the reefer's chassis. This resulted in damage to the tubular main frame on the passenger side and a cracked front windshield to the Mule. The chassis also sustained damage to the bottom left corner on its front side.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the primary cause of this incident was due to Mr. Gico reaching over to retrieve a power cord while vehicle was in motion. He recommended that Electrician Gico's driving privileges be suspended and that he receive necessary training to operate Port equipment. He also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Hydraulic Oil Spill – Top Lifter No.16-08 Case No. 26-17

On Tuesday, March 21, 2017, the GM received a report dated Friday, March 17, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a hydraulic oil spill with Top Lifter 16-08 that had occurred on that day. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Transportation Operator III Ronnie Sablan was operating Top Lifter No. 16-08 and was assigned to ground incoming containers. While Operator Sablan was grounding a 40 foot container at Area N, he had adjusted the spreader and noticed a hydraulic oil leak. He then immediately shut down the Top Lifter and reported the incident to Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion who in turned notified Safety Inspector John Troy Santos and Port Police Officer II Angela M. Cabrera

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that approximately one quart of hydraulic oil had spilled and covered a pavement area of 20' X 20'. The Nation Response Center was notified and Report #1173410 was issued.

Fleet Mechanic I Richard Flores determined that the oil leak is due to wear and tear on high pressure hose that supplies hydraulic oil to the spreader.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board with an emphasis on maintenance of equipment and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Damaged Property Case No. 27-17

On Thursday March 23, 2017, the GM received a report dated Tuesday, March 21, 2017, from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning damaged pavement that had been discovered by Detailed Safety Inspector Robert Lau while conducting an inspection at the EQMR Warehouse on Monday, March 21, 2017. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that the scuffs and scrapes to the asphalt extended between the EQMR building and the Diesel Fuel Surface Tank at Drum Lot No. 2. He also reported that an old dilapidated wooden shack had been relocated from the inbound lane to the front of Facility Maintenance shop for demolition. Facilities Maintenance Leader Dave Taitano had tasked Building Maintenance Supervisor Ray Munoz to demolish the shack and to place the debris into the dumpster. Facilities Maintenance Leader Taitano himself had decided to relocate the dumpster from its location by the Drum Lot 2 to the front of the Facility Maintenance Shop. After he demolished the wooden shack and placed all the lumber into the dumpster, he relocated the dumpster back to its original location.

Safety Administrator Acfalle stated that Facilities Maintenance Leader Taitano had used a 5-Ton forklift to relocate the dumpster. He had elevated and chained one end of the dumpster to the forks and pulled it to Facility Maintenance Shop. The dumpster on one end was designed so that it could be hooked and winched off and onto a flatbed. The opposite end of the dumpster was

fitted with metal casters to bear the load so that the dumpster could be rolled instead of dragged while it was being offloaded or loaded onto a flatbed.

Safety Administrator Acfalle went on to report that the dumpster with metal casters was not designed to travel any significant distance. The metal casters were designed to assist in off-loading/loading of the dumpster onto a flatbed. He also reported that Facilities Maintenance Leader Taitano did not report the incident as required.

Safety Administrator Acfalle went on to state that OSHA 29 CFR 1910.178 Refresher training in relevant topics shall be provided to an operator when: the operator has been observed to operate the vehicle in an unsafe manner; the operator has been involved in an accident or near-miss incident; the operator has received an evaluation that reveals that the operator is not operating the equipment safely.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the dumpster with casters was only designed to assist in off-loading and loading onto a flatbed utilizing a winch system. The lumber from the demolished shack should have been palletized and transported by forklift to the dumpster for disposal.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that Facilities Maintenance Leader Taitano's forklift operator privilege be suspended pending refresher training on the proper operation of a forklift. He also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage to Official License Plate Case No. 28-17

On Friday, March 24, 2017, the GM received a report dated Tuesday March 21, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning damaged the license plate of Official No. LP#6314 that had occurred that day. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Safety Inspector II Kenneth Santos had reported that Stevedore Supervisor Junior Topasna had been conducting a pre-operations check of Official No. LP#6314 when he noted that the vehicle had been parked with the front license plate butted up against the U.S. Customs Border Patrol's (USCBP) box trailer's hitch. The box trailer is located near the Pedestrian Gatehouse shack. Stevedore Leader Richard Dydasco was the last operator of the official and was the operator that parked the official at the Pedestrian Gate.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that the damage to the vehicle resulted in a bending of the license plate and the license plate frame. The USCBP's box trailer and hitch did not receive any damage. Port Police II Angela Cabrera contacted the USCBP office USCBP Supervisor Kenneth Gibbons to report the incident and reported no damage to the box trailer or hitch. PO II Cabrera relayed USCBP Supervisor Gibbons that she is the point of contact for this particular incidence. Safety Inspector II Kenneth Santos and Port Police II Angela Cabrera responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Afalle also reported that Stevedore Leader Dydasco operated the official vehicle without a trip ticket and parked the official in a manner that caused minor damage to the license plate and its frame.

Safety Administrator Afalle recommended that the Dispatch Office personnel personally issue and receive Trip Tickets and vehicles and provide a visual accounting of the vehicles being turned in and issued out. He added that the Accident Review Board was working with the Transportation Superintendent to submit recommendations on how best to accomplish this procedure. Safety Administrator Acfalle further recommended that equipment operators be suspended from operating any equipment until they are re-trained. He also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage to Gantry Tie Down Case No. 29-17

On Friday, March 31, 2017, the GM received a report dated Monday, March 27, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning an incident that occurred Friday, March 24, 2017 concerning property damage to the concrete encasement of the Gantry Tie Down. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Safety Inspector II John Troy Santos was conducting a periodic inspection and was observing the ramp-up preparation for the Vessel Green Lake. He noted that when the plywood was removed from under the ramp, he observed concrete spalling surrounding the Gantry Tie Down and noted that it sustained some damages. The Gantry Tie Down is located between 2550 Cleat and 2300 Bollard. Safety Inspector II Santos reported that Ambyth Agent Joe Guerrero was present at the sight and acknowledged the damage. Port Police Officer II Eric Salas I and Police Officer II Joy Cruz responded to this incident.

Safety Inspector II Santos reported that the damage was 4" X 5" X 3/4" deep with an estimated cost of repair from the Engineering Division at \$490.00

Safety Inspector II Santos concluded that the Gantry tie down box was a few inches higher from the rest of the dock creating an uneven distribution of the weight on the ramp and possibly placing more of the ramp's weight on the concrete surrounding the Gantry Tie Down. He also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage at Area P Case No. 30-17

On Wednesday, March 29, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector II John Troy Santos concerning property Damage at Area P that occurred that day. According to Safety Inspector II Santos, Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion reported the damage and relayed that Operator II Ricky Garrido had been operating Tractor T-108 and had been assigned

to the Vessel Kyowa Rose. He further reported that Operator Garrido was in Area Q searching for a grounded container but did not find it. While he was exiting area Q and turned left into area P to continue his search of the container he executed a tight turn instead of a wide turn that resulted in him hitting a Jersey Barrier. Operator Garrido immediately informed Transportation Leader Concepcion of the incident. Also Port Police Officer II Angela Cabrera was present at the scene.

Safety Inspector II Santos reported that Tractor No. T-108 sustained a1/2" in diameter x 1/6" depth to the front right side of bumper.

Safety Inspector II Santos determined in his findings that drivers are trained to make wide turns when exiting and entering container isles and alleys to prevent this type of incident that occurred. He also concluded that Operator Garrido was focused on finding his container and was inattentive of his surroundings and was not adhering to his operator training.

Safety Inspector II Santos recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Equipment Damage to Tractor No. T-749 Case No. 31-17

On Wednesday, April 5, 2017, the GM received report dated Tuesday, April 4, 2017, from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning equipment Damage to Tractor No. 749 that had occurred on Monday, April 3, 2017. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Detailed Safety Inspector Robert Lau had been conducting his routine inspection of the yard and operations and witnessed a tire rolling and hitting a new vehicle.

Safety Inspector Lau's investigation determined that Equipment Operator Danny Jr. Zamora had been assigned to operate Tractor No. 749, and was assisting with the vanning of vehicles in front of the CFS Warehouse. Equipment Operator Zamora was traveling west, between former Warehouse No. 2 area and Mobile Harbor Crane, when the left front tire of his Tractor became dethatched, rolled and hit a new vehicle identified as a Mitsubishi Outlander. The Mitsubishi Outlander vehicle had been discharged from the Vessel Venus Leader on Saturday, April 1, 2017. The Mitsubishi was parked on the concrete pad of the former Warehouse 2 building waiting to be processed. The Mitsubishi sustained damages to the right fender, right rim and tire. Safety Inspector Robert Lau and Port Police II Jonathan Aguon had responded to this incident.

Safety Inspector Lau went on to report that Equipment Operator Zamora had been issued a trip ticket and performed his inspection of Tractor No. 749 and did not note any discrepancies. He also reported that after the tire came off the tractor, it rolled approximately 50 feet before hitting the Mitsubishi vehicle. The tire rolled another 100 feet before coming to a stop. Tractor No. 749's left front tire/wheel and axle hub assembly came off of the front axle as one component. He noted that Tractor No. 749 is owned by MATSON but is maintained and operated by PAG personnel.

Safety Inspector Lau also reported that Fleet Mechanic Leader William Hudson stated that mechanical failure was due to a worn out outer wheel bearing. He added that MSA Operator Manager Byron Valera had been notified of the incident.

Safety Inspector Lau concluded that Equipment Operator Zamora conducted his pre-trip inspection and did not find deficiencies. The operator's level of inspection is based on normal daily operational checks and may not be able to detect most mechanical components that may have a potential to fail. He also noted that Fleet Maintenance should defer to manufactures schedule for servicing components based on hours of usage and/or mileage driven. Safety Inspector Lau recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage to Tractor No. 106 Case No. 32-17

On Friday, April 7, 2017, the GM received a report dated Wednesday, April 5, 2017, from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning property damage to Tractor No. 106. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Safety Inspector II Kenneth Santos had received a radio call from Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion reporting a Property Damage incident.

Operator II Herbert Perez had been assigned to a load back operation on the Vessel Maunawili. Operator II Perez stated that as he was driving by F6 when he pulled over to disengage his chassis because the brakes were locking up. After disengaging the chassis from his Tractor, he drove off forgetting to disconnect the air lines.

Port Police Officer II Eric Salas interviewed Operator Perez after the incident and inquired if he was taking any medication or was there anything that was bothering him that he didn't disconnect the air lines? Mr. Perez responded that he was not under any medication and stated that he was just frustrated as he felt like he was the only one pulling containers to load the vessel in his line up.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that Operator Perez had disengaged the chassis but forgot to disconnect his air lines and that while Operator Perez voiced some frustration with other drivers not pulling their load he should have voiced his concerns to his supervisors.

Safety Administrator Acfalle further stated that the Safety Division has been providing training to the drivers and noted that the next available window for mass driver training was scheduled for Monday, April 17th and Tuesday, April 18, 2017.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Hydraulic Oil Spill Top Lifter No. 16-10 Case No. 33-17

On Friday, April 7, 2017, the GM received a report dated Thursday, April 6 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a hydraulic oil spill from Top Lifter No. 16-10. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Equipment Operator II Kevin Sanchez had been assigned to Yard operations and was loading containers onto tractors at "Foreign" grounded area located on the South Side of the CFS building.

Operator II Sanchez was traveling the Top Lifter (unloaded) when he noticed oil leaking from a hydraulic hose located on the mast of the Top Lifter. Operator II Sanchez immediately shut down the Top Lifter and notified his Supervisor Crane Operator Leader Joe Bamba.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that approximately 1/2-gallon of hydraulic oil had escaped from the hydraulic hose. He also relayed that Transportation personnel used absorbent pads and sand to perform the necessary cleanup. The National Response Center was notified and issued Report No. 1174961

Safety Administrator Acfalle also reported that Port Police Officer II Joy Cruz and Safety Inspector II Joshua Candoleta responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the primary cause of the incident was a faulty hydraulic hose line and added that faulty hydraulic hoses continue to be a problem with the new Top Lifters. He also stated that Acting EQMR Manager Joaquin Pangelinan was in communication with the Vendor to address possible fixes.

Safety Administrator Acfalle also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage – Tractor No. 86 Case No. 34-17

On Monday, April 10, 2017, the GM received a report dated Thursday, April 6, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning property damage to Tractor No. 86 that had occurred that day. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Environmental Specialist Paul Santos had received a call from Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion reporting that Operator II Herbert Perez had been assigned to work the Vessel APL Guam and was parking an empty chassis at the Area Echo. During this process, he had reversed the tractor and dropped his fifth wheel which disengaged the chassis. However, Operator II Perez did not disconnect his air hose line hose before driving forward resulting in the in the hose tearing off the tractor. Environmental Specialist Santos and Port police Officer II Eric Salas responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined that Operator II Perez had failed to disconnect the Glad Hand from the chassis. Fortunately, there was no damage to the chassis or chassis air hose line connector on the chassis.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that Operator II Perez had disengaged the chassis but had forgotten to disconnect the air lines. He reported that Operator II Perez had since been trained on SWPP and Accident Prevention and Defensive Driving on Saturday, 8, April 2017.

Safety Administrator Acfalle also recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage - Kyowa Cattleya Vehicle Case No. 35-17

On Monday, April 10, 2017, the GM received a report dated Friday, April 7, 2017 from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning damage to a vehicle that was being discharged from the Vessel Kyowa Cattleya on Wednesday, April 5, 2017. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Stevedore Supervisor II Patrick Alvarez had contacted Detailed Safety Inspector Robert Lau to report damages to one of the vehicles being discharged from the Vessel Kyowa Cattleya identified as a white Hyundai Veloster.

Stevedore Casual Woodrow Concepcion had been assigned to discharge new vehicles off the Vessel Kyowa Cattleya and was operating the Hyundai Veloster when this incident happened. Stevedore Casual Concepcion stated that he was following the hand signals and instructions from the Spotter Stevedore Leader Richard Dydasco but due to the tight space, he misjudged the clearance causing the front passenger tire hubcap, rim, and fender valance to hit the watertight bulkhead door lock handle. Stevedore Leader Dydasco stated that on Stevedore Casual Concepcion's attempt to exit the twin deck, the vehicle was too close to the door lock handle. Stevedore Leader Dydasco then instructed Stevedore Casual Concepcion to stop, reverse and turn the steering wheel left. However, Stevedore Leader Dydasco stated that Stevedore Casual Concepcion turned right instead causing the collision. Detailed Safety Inspector Lau and Port Police II Joy Cruz responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that Stevedore Casual Concepcion was exiting Cargo Hold No.1, the right front tire made contact with the watertight bulkhead door lock handle. This resulted in minor damages to the vehicle's right front hubcap, rim, and fender valence. Safety Administrator Acfalle also determined that there was insufficient clearance between the vehicles right front clip and the watertight bulkhead door and concluded that Stevedore Casual Concepcion did not follow Stevedore Leader Dydasco's instructions which would have prevented the incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Property Damage to 5-Ton Forklift No. 16-46 Case No. 36-17

On Tuesday, April 11, 2017, the GM received a report dated Saturday, April 8, 2017, from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning property damage to 5-Ton Forklift No. 16-46. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Environmental Compliance Specialist Paul Santos had received a call from Stevedore Supervisor I Reed Topasna reporting to him that there was property damage involving 5-Ton Forklift No. 16-46 by Stevedore Casual Woody Concepcion while he was relocating a shoe box from the dockside of F-5 to the Cone Basket (flat rack that stores all the shoe boxes) located by the area of LC-3.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Stevedore Casual Concepcion traveled in between the Cone Basket and a 40' container (parked paralleled approximately 20' away) to off load the shoe box. While in between the container and the Cone Basket, Stevedore Casual Concepcion turned left to off load the shoe box, the back end of the fork lift made contact with the side of the container causing paint to chip off the fork lift. Stevedore Casual Concepcion did not report the incident to Stevedore Supervisor I Reed Topasna until two and a half hours after the incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Forklift No. 16-46 was not assigned to Stevedore Casual Concepcion but was assigned to Stevedore Casual Raymond Gofigan in support of Vessel Kyowa Rose operations at F-5 dockside. Stevedore Casual Gofigan stated that he never gave Stevedore Casual Concepcion authorization to utilize the forklift. Mr. Gofigan sated he did not know that Mr. Concepcion drove the fork lift. Stevedore Casual Gofigan stated that he informed his Stevedore Supervisor I Topasna about the incident at 1900hrs. In response, Stevedore Casual Gofigan stated that Stevedore Supervisor I Topasna was furious that the incident was not reported immediately and that Stevedore Casuals Gofigan and Concepcion both acknowledged that in their briefings, have been notified and are aware to report any incidents or accidents immediately to their supervisors. Compliance Specialist Santos and Port Police II Albert Gabriel responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that Stevedore Casual Gofigan, while the authorized driver, did not have a Trip Ticket properly filled out. Also, Stevedore Casual Concepcion stated that he operated the fork lift simply to help with the completion of vessel operations but waited until his shift was completed at 1900hrs to report the incident even though he was fully aware of his responsibility to report all incidents. Safety Administrator Acfalle also determined that the paint damage to Forklift No. 16-46 was approximately 5 inches long by 2 inches wide.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that Stevedore Causal Conception was an unauthorized operator of the forklift and that both he and Stevedore Casual Gofigan failed to report the incident to their supervisor immediately.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that Stevedore Casual Concepcion's forklift driving privileges be revoked pending forklift refresher training.

Safety Administrator Acfalle further recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

Work Injury Case No. 37-17

On Friday, April 14, 2017, the GM received a report dated Wednesday, April 12, 2017, from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a work injury that had occurred as far back as Friday, March 24, 2017. He stated that Safety Inspector II Joshua Candoleta had received a call from Port Police II James Sandlin requesting him to meet at the Port Command Center to respond to a work injury report.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Stevedore Casual Wenceslaus Reyes had been working in support of Vessel Green Lake's line handling operations. Also working with Stevedore Reyes on this operation were Stevedore Casual I Jose Tajalle and Stevedore Casual Rene Topasna, The Stevedores had been assigned to let go the bow lines for the departure of Vessel Green Lake. Stevedore Casual Topasna was tasked to shadow Stevedores Reyes and Tajalle on this operation. Stevedore Reyes stated that he and Stevedore Tajalle lifted the rope over the 1550 Bollard but a portion of the rope was wedged between the Bollard's cross rod and the stern line of Vessel Kota Henning. Stevedore Reyes stated that Stevedore Topasna instructed Stevedore Casual Tajalle to kick the rope. Stevedore Reyes stated that after Stevedore Tajalle's attempts to kick and free the rope had failed, he attempted to free the rope by kicking it as instructed. Stevedore Reyes and stated that during one of his kicks (he was using the heel portion of his safety shoe to kick the rope) his right ankle rolled and he then felt it pop and experienced immediate sharp pain to his right ankle. Stevedore Reyes stated that he informed Stevedore Casual Topasna that he hurt his ankle when he kicked the rope and that Stevedore Casual Topasna told him to be more careful.

Safety Administrator Acfalle further reported that Stevedore Tajalle stated that Stevedore Topasna had instructed him and Stevedore Casual Reyes to "kick the line, just kick the line". Stevedore Topasna stated that no time did he instruct Stevedore Casual Reyes or Stevedore Tajalle to kick the line.

Stevedore Casual Reyes called Planner Work Coordinator Corrina Quinata on Saturday, March 25, 2017 to inform her that he might not be able to work on next scheduled day on Monday, March 27, 2017 because his ankle was swollen and painful as a result of his incident on March 24, 2017. Planner Work Coordinator Quinata supposedly told Casual Stevedore Reyes to come in Monday, March 27, 2017 and "We will take it from there."

Stevedore Reyes called Supervisor I Robert Meeks Sunday, March 26, 2017, to inform him that he will be calling in sick for March 27, 2017 because his ankle was still swollen and painful from the incident on March 24, 2017. Supervisor Meeks inquired if he had reported the incident and

Stevedore Casual Reyes replied that he did not report it to a supervisor but he did tell Stevedore Topasna that he hurt his ankle while kicking the rope. Supervisor Meeks instructed Stevedore Casual Reyes to call work on March 27, 2017 and inform the Supervisor on duty of his issues.

Stevedore Topasna stated that earlier in the day on March 24, 2017, he noticed Stevedore Casual Reyes was limping and that he had responded that he was moving some things out of his house and twisted his ankle.

On Thursday, March 30, 2017, Stevedore Casual Reyes stated that the pain and swelling on his right ankle had gotten worse and is seen at Guam Memorial Hospital that day.

Safety Administrator Acfalle stated that Stevedore Casual Reyes's injury had not been reported until March 30, 2017. He also stated that the protocol to loosen wedged or stuck lines was to ask the vessels crew to give slack to the line. Stevedores then should step back and move away from the rope until enough slack is given to loosen the rope.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that Stevedore Casual Reyes had injured his ankle while attempting to kick the rope free during line handling operations for Vessel Green Lake. He also noted that Stevedore Casual Reyes failed to immediately and officially report the incident to his supervisor and fill out a GWC-201 (Notice of Employee's Injury/Illness or Death). Stevedore Casual Reyes stated that he informed Stevedore Topasna that he hurt his ankle after kicking the rope while they were still at dockside. He also stated that Stevedore Casual Reyes stated that Stevedore Topasna told him to be more careful. According to the statements provided by Stevedore Casual Reyes, Stevedore Topasna was aware of the incident on 24 March 2017, 1721hrs, Planner Work Coordinator Quinata was aware of the incident on 25 March 2017, 1200hrs and Supervisor I Meeks was aware of the incident on 26 March 2017, 1930hrs but no action was taken to document the incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that he spoke with WCC Representative Manny Pablo recommended authorizing treatment for Stevedore Casual Reyes' injury. He explained that he may have hurt his ankle earlier at home but aggravated the ankle while kicking the rope at work. Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that this incident is discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then provide recommendations to the General Manager on this matter.

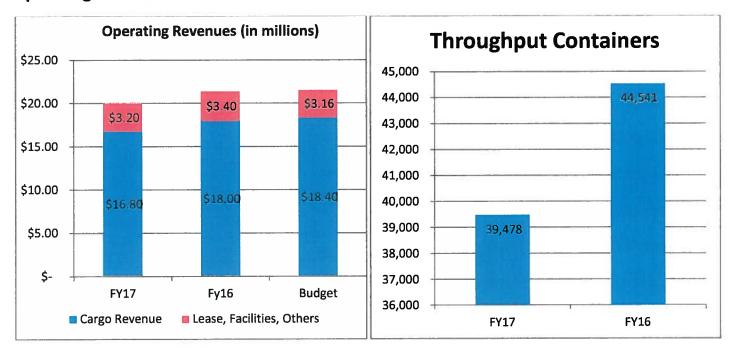

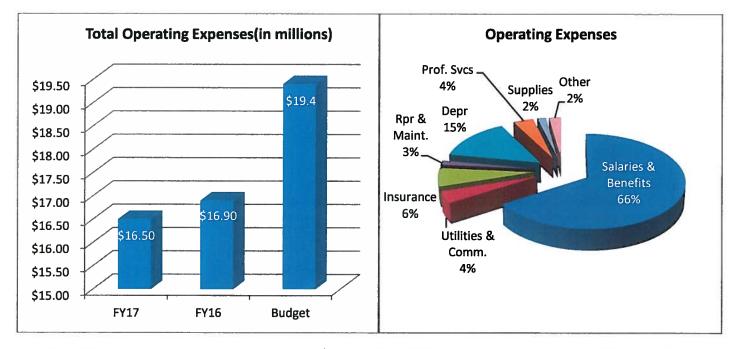
Total Operating Revenues as of February 2017 was \$20 million, which consist of \$16.8 million in cargo revenues and \$3.2 million in Facilities, Leases, and Other Services.

FY17 YTD cargo revenue is 7% lower than last year's total (\$18 mil) and 8% lower than Budget (\$18.4 mil).

FY17 YTD Facilities, Leases, and Other Services as of February is 6% lower than last year (\$3.4 mil) and 2% higher than budget (\$3.16mil).

Overall Operating Revenues as of February is 7% lower than Budget (\$21.5 mil) and 6% lower than last year's year to date February (\$21.4 mil).

Total number of containers handled as of February 2017 was 39,478 which is 11% lower compared to last year February total 44,541.



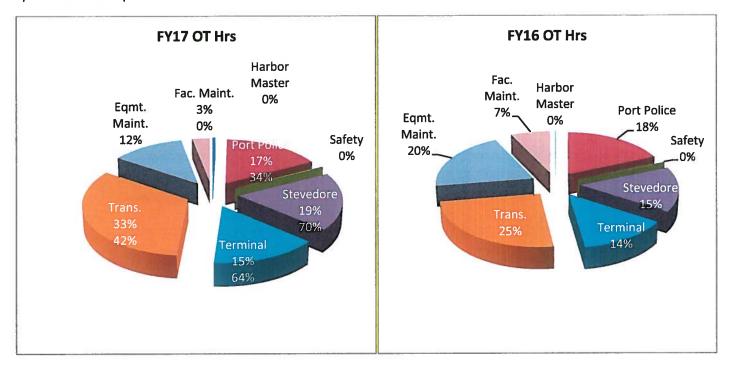
Total Operating Expenses as of February 2017 was \$16.5 million, which is 15% lower than Budget (\$19.4 mil) and 3% lower than last year's total operating expenses (\$16.9 mil).

Total Overtime as of February 2017 was \$780 thousand which is 20% higher than last year February (\$650 thousand). Direct Labor Revenue as of February was \$1.3 million, which is 9% lower than last year and 4% lower than budget. Direct Labor charges are for services performed by Port employees under special service request and differentials under the throughput.

Year to date Operating Revenues minus the Year to date Operating Expenses resulted to an Operating Income of \$3.6 million as of February 28, 2017.

Non Operating Revenues and Expenses consist of the following: \$1.3 million-Retirement contribution for COLA, Supplemental and Medical/Dental/Life Insurance expenses, \$466 thousand-Interest expense on loans and \$23k Interest Income. The net total of non operating expenses and revenues as of February is a negative \$1.5 million.

The Total Net Income as of February is \$2 million.

Accounts Receivable Trade (net) as of February 28, 2017 is \$5.4 million.

Aging Status is a follows: 70% - Current, 12% - over 30 days, 3% - over 60 days, 0% - over 90 days and 14% - over 120 days.

Accounts Payable Trade as of February 28, 2017 is \$685 thousand which is 59% lower than last month ending balance of \$1.7 million.

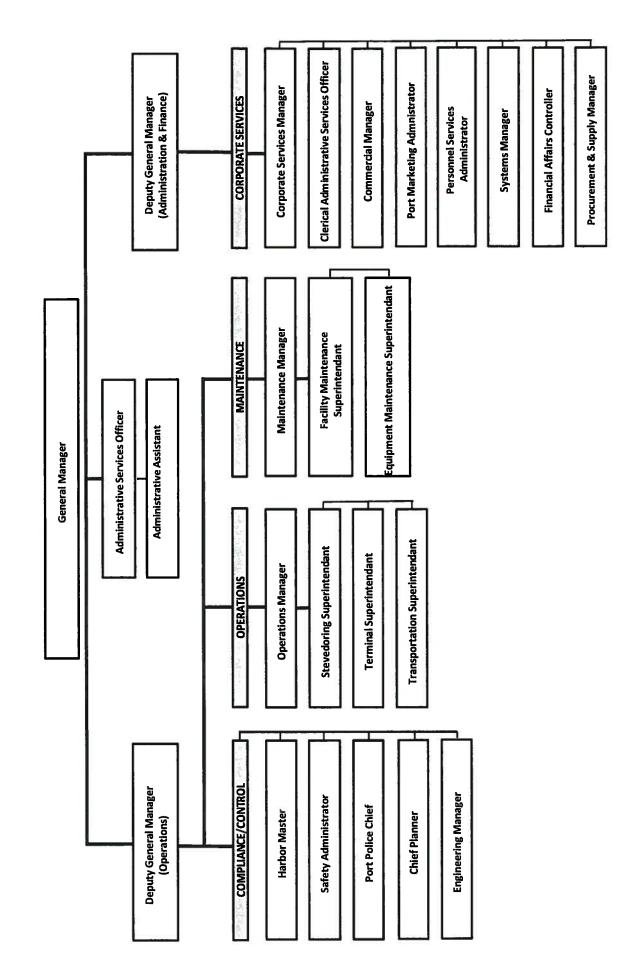

At issue this date is a request from Management for Board authorization to reprogram the amount of \$50,000 from Item 31 of the Mid-Year Budget Capital Improvement Projects listing titled 'Mobil Pipe Line Misc. Maintenance' for purposes related to replacing the interior fender system at Golf Pier.

In letter dated April 7, 2017, Mobil gave notice to the Port that they desired to make certain improvements to the fender system at Golf Pier to allow a newer class of vessels servicing the region the ability to safely moor up against the pier facility to discharge and receive petroleum products.

The initial cost estimate for the project was US\$100,000 to US\$120,000; however, in discussion had with Mobil rep on April 24th, it is likely that the estimate will go up to US\$150,000.

It is the positon of staff that there is no disputing the need for the improvement. Further, it is our desire to provide Mobil with the required approval in the form of a Notice to Proceed. In doing so, would require that we also firm up the funding for the project. It is proposed that this project be funded in the following manner.

- \$50,000 Mobil, through the proceeds already paid for the purpose pursuant to the 2nd Amendment of the 1990 Management Agreement;
- \$50,000 Mobil has agreed, through its representative, to contribute this amount as its share for the project; and
- \$50,000 proposed Port share of the project to improve the interior fenders system of the pier.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

- 1. Board approval for management to reprogram the amount of US\$50,000 from Item 31 of the Mid-Year Budget Capital Improvement Projects listing titled 'Mobil Pipe Line Misc. Maintenance' for purposes related to replacing the interior fender system at Golf Pier; and
